affiliated with the Wendy Klag Center for Autism & Developmental Disabilities at the Bloomberg School. Her selected mentor is Dr. M. Daniele Fallin. Dr. Dickerson holds a BS in Biology and MSPH in Epidemiology from the University of Alabama at Birmingham and PhD in Epidemiology from the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston. She received a year of postdoctoral training at the US Environmental Protection Agency before completing a postdoctoral fellowship at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. Her interdisciplinary research primarily focuses on environmental risk factors for neurodevelopmental and neurodegenerative disorders. Additionally, she investigates the influence of disparities in neurodevelopmental assessments and service provision along with environmental justice issues in underserved communities. Her work under this award will examine parental occupational exposures to persistent and accumulative toxicants, such as heavy metals and solvents, and risk of autism spectrum disorder in offspring.
